Description of the course

This class explores the works of two fundamental Latin poets: Catullus, whose poems date to last phase of the republican history, and Ovid, active under Augustus, Rome's first emperor. Grammar will be regularly reviewed, while reading selections from these two authors. The emphasis of the course is on translation and interpretation as well as on the mastering of new specific vocabulary. Basic questions concerning sexuality and gender in Rome will be regularly addressed. The exploration of each work will be preceded by the study of its historical and social context. Regular quizzes, a midterm and a final exam will be administered to assess the student's progress.
