Description of the course

This course is designed to provide students with an introduction to classical mythology. Both literary and material sources will be considered. The myths of the Greeks and the Romans will be examined from different perspectives, such as their historical context, their social relevance, their religious significance and their implications in terms of gender and sexuality. The topics targeted will include, but will not be limited to, myths of creation and destruction, Olympian deities, myths of fertility, myths of death and heroic figures. In the last section of the course we will explore how Western literature has frequently reworked ancient myth in ways that are significant both to ancient and modern culture. Regular quizzes will test your mastery of reading and lecture material. The midterm exam will be administered on 10/16/13. The date of the final exam is TBD. Regular discussions will develop from the problems presented by the texts at hand; participation and attendance in class are therefore of paramount importance.
